I would also like to remind everyone that our spring membership drive is still ongoing so if you have not already sent in your membership for 2016 it is not too late.


The BBQ and membership will be covered in more detail further in this newsletter.





Post Offices of Central and Northern Alberta.

Continuing in our series of historical looks at post offices in Central and Northern Alberta, for this issue, I have selected post offices along the old Grand Trunk Pacific Railway line which ran through East Central Alberta. It is currently the CNR line that parallels Hiway 14. The GTP was known as the Alphabet Railway. In the first decade of the 20th century, the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway embarked on constructing a northern transcontinental railway across Canada in competition with the southern route taken by the CPR in 1885. The use of steam locomotives meant that railway stations and sidings needed to be constructed every few miles to service both trains and the influx of homesteaders that were about to pour into the vast unsettled Prairies. An unknown person or persons at the Grand Trunk offices took it upon themselves to systematically name each unnamed siding along the line in alphabetical order east-to-west. Across the prairies,

93 stations were named in the scheme, completing five rounds of the alphabet and the beginning of a sixth. The only breaks in the system come where there wasn't enough population to warrant a siding, or where the railway ran into a locality that already had a name. In each case, the letter would be skipped. The Grand Trunk also cheated a tad by mostly glossing over the letters Q and X

Many of these sidings became towns and took on the name assigned by the GTP, and so as we look at town names from Wainwright to Edmonton, (Wainwright, Fabyan, Hawkins, Irma, Jarrow, Kinsella, Meighen, Nestor, Poe, Ryley, Shonts, Tofield, Uncas, Ardrossan, Bremner, Clover Bar, Edmonton) we see the result of this naming convention. A few towns like Bruce and Holden already existed so the names were retained and do not follow the alphabetic sequence.

Closed Post Offices

Shonts AB

Approximately 8 km east of Tofield. The Grand Trunk Pacific Railway established a siding here in 1909 and named it as one of the alphabetically named sidings after Theodore Perry Shonts, (1856-1919), president of several U.S. railroads. There was never a post office at this location, only the siding and grain elevator. The original elevator at Shonts, Alberta, has some historical significance. Around 1969 it was moved from Shonts, and is now a fully restored and operating museum piece at Calgary's Heritage Park. The Security Elevator Company Ltd. was a company formed to build grain elevators on the newly constructed Grand Trunk Pacific Railway

(today part of CN). The Grand Trunk Pacific went out of business in the late 1920s. The Shonts elevator was the last elevator completed by the Security Elevator Company.

A second elevator was constructed and still stands next to Hiway 14 at Shonts between Tofield and Ryley. The western face is painted with the name "Dirty Shonts". The story apparently is that one Halloween some local boys altered the name from "SHONTs" to "SHORTs". Several years later some local boys were more daring and managed to paint the word "DIRTY" above the word "SHORTs".

Poe AB Opened 1912 -Closed 1964

Approximately 8 km east of Ryley AB. The Grand Trunk Pacific Railway established a station here in 1909 and named it as one of the alphabetically named sidings. It is named after Edgar Allan Poe (1809-1849), the American writer, literary critic, and essayist.

The post office operated at this site from February

1912 through February 1964. It was never much more than a post office and grain elevator site.

The elevator is still standing. It is the lonely sentinel east of Ryley on Hiway 14. It is one of only 2 remaining National Grain Company elevators still in existence.

The First Postmaster was C.H. McLennan. Other postmasters were Mrs. R.A. Bradley, George Kerr, Ole Kirkelund, James Bracegirdle, Frank Kolodychuk,

Martin Gienger, Wm. Thomson, Esther Kail, Helen Roloff, August Auch, and Arthur Auch

Uncas AB Opened 1925 - Closed 1968

An acreage subdivision within Strathcona County, approximately 30 km east of Edmonton. The Grand Trunk Pacific Railway established a station here in 1909, and named it after the town of the same name in Oklahoma. James Fenimore Cooper introduced a character by this name in his novel The Last of the

Mohicans.

The post office operated from August 1925 through May 1968. Postmasters were; Jos. E. Harrison, Mrs. Kezia Harrison, Nick Shewchuk (30 yrs), Lilly Sank (10 yrs)

Current Post Offices

Tofield AB. Opened 1898

Tofield, a town 65 km southeast of Edmonton on Hiway 14, was named after Dr. James Henry Tofield an English medical man who arrived at Fort Edmonton in 1882, and served in the North West Rebellion of 1885. Dr. Tofield eventually settled in the hamlet during the 1890s.

The first Tofield Post office was established in 1898 and was located about 5 miles north of the current town, close to the Logan Post office. A few years later, it was relocated to the current town site.

The early settlement of present day Tofield actually had 3 different town sites. The first site began in

1906 at a site southeast of present-day Tofield. Very soon after that, the town moved to a site north of the present town site near the proposed route of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway. Later that year the GTP decided on a route south of the second town site and the town was moved again, to its present location. Tofield was proclaimed a village on September 9, 1907 and became a town just two years later in 1909.

Tofield Postmasters have been; George Cookson (10 Yrs), C.H. Crest, Clarence Jamieson, J.W. Somers, Ed. Beirnes, Allan Clutterham (25 yrs), William Drew, Edith Dairson, Norman Glover(22 yrs), E.J. Nolan

Holden AB. Opened 1904

Holden was one of the locations where the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway used the existing village name. Holden initially underwent a few name changes. In 1903 the community began under the name 'Pleasant Ridge'. The first Post Office was established in 1904 under the name Vermilion Valley. In 1906, to remove confusion with the town of Vermilion, the name "Holden" was chosen in recognition of the first local member of the new Alberta provincial legislature, the late Mr. J. B. Holden. The Post

Office name was changed to Holden in 1907. The arrival of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, in 1909, opened up a whole new array of opportunities. Holden was formally incorporated as a village on April 14, 1909. Postmasters; W. Campbell, Norman Smith, William Campbell, E.W. Hayes, Dr. Samuel Farrell (20 Yrs), Walter Stewart, Eugene Bilyk (17 yrs), Mrs. O.M. Bilyk, Ronald Hanrahan, G.J. Schissler, Harriet Giebelhaus

Viking AB. Opened 1904

In 1908, the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway using the alphabetic naming convention, originally named this siding and station "Meighen" after Arthur Meighen who was a federal MP at the time, but who eventually became Canada's ninth Prime Minister. The GTP did this despite there being settlement in the area. The Harland post office had been established in 1907 and was located about 2 km south east of present day Viking. The area residents did not want the name Meighen, and instead held a vote. The Scandinavian contingent, located mostly on the north side of the community wanted the name Viking, after the post office (1904-09) by that name

located approximately 10 km to the north east. Those on the south side, mainly Czechs, favored Prague, after the post office (1906-18) by that name located approximately 25 km to the south west. The Scandinavians must have turned out in greater numbers for the vote as the name "Viking" won the day. The Harland Post Office was renamed and moved to the new location in 1909, the same year that the first town council was formed.

Restructuring the Canada Post Pension Plan: - Update

This applies only to Canada Post retirees that have retired after Oct 1, 2000. Those members that retired prior to Oct 2000 are on the Public Service Superannuation Plan, and are not affected by these potential changes.

After much delay, the first meeting of the C&C Group was held on November 12, 2015, in Ottawa. The C&C Group representatives were scheduled to meet again in April and then two more times in 2016. It is hoped that with information now starting to be provided to our C&C Representatives, that we will soon start to hear something from that group.

The role of C&C Group representatives is to help facilitate the exchange of information between the Corporation and the Plan members they represent.

In addition, the annual Pension Report to members and the audited financial statements are normally completed by March 31, and then published 8- 10 weeks after that. The 2015 Pension Report to members and the audited financial statements should therefore be released soon. That report provides information about the pension plan's financial situation, investment performance, membership and services delivered to members. It is hoped that here will be a statement in that report updating the pension reform issue.
