## 1971 - The Postal Code is Introduced

In 1950, the total volume of mail moving through the Canadian postal system was 1.4 billion items, but by 1966, postal workers were processing 49 billion letters. The increase was enormous, and of course it demanded a larger work force. Between 1957 and 1966 alone, the number of postal staff increased from 30,000 to 44,000. In addition, due to the growth of the cities, letter sorters had to memorize huge amounts of information about letter carrier routes. This reality, combined with the desire to speed up the flow of mail, prompted postal administrators to acquire machines for automating the entire process of sorting, an initiative that inevitably required the introduction of the postal code. This first step in the whole process was taken in 1971.

The submission of a 1969 feasibility report to the Post Office department on establishing a postal code in Canada led to the creation of the Coding and Mechanization Branch the following year. Ottawa was chosen for the pilot coding and on 1 April 1971 it was the first city in Canada to be coded. The work then continued with the coding of an entire province, Manitoba was the first province to be coded and finally the rest of the country.

The Post Office department opted for an alphanumeric code, (ANA NAN). This flexible system allowed possible combinations in the neighborhood of 7.2 million postal codes. The three characters in the first group are a regional indicator; the second three are a local indicator. The first letter of the regional indicator refers to a very large area, such as a province or a substantial part of a province. The other two characters indicate an urban area or a group of towns or villages. The characters in the local indicator determine the address of one side of a street, a building in a city or a rural post office. Consequently, there is real precision in the alphanumeric system. It is superior to the American zip code of only five numerals, which ultimately is only equivalent to our regional indicator alone. The British postal code, which is five to seven characters, is closer to our own, but the comparison stops there,

for the numerals and letters in that system are not always in the same order.

The postal code, at first had to be typed so that it could be machine-readable by an Optical Character Reader (OCR) sortation machine. Since 1990, however, it has been possible to read even handwritten codes thanks to the Multiline Optical Character Reader (MOCR), a machine, which, by 1994, could also cancel letters. With the newest MLOCR technology each machine can now process more than 36,000 letters per hour (10 letters every second).



The introduction of the postal code with its attendant upheaval of the work environment did not pass without friction. The job losses caused by automation were a great cause for concern for the unions. The 1970s were punctuated by a series of strikes, compounded by a national campaign to boycott the postal code (1972-1976). The unions attempted to persuade citizens and business people to refrain from using the postal code until postal workers had received their fair share of the profits generated by use of this new technology. The tense labour climate of the time made these years among the most difficult in post office history.

However, mechanization moved ahead, and the total mechanization of mail processing ushered in by the postal code was one of the biggest changes in the Canadian postal service since its beginnings.

## Aviation Museum marks 100 years since first airmail flight in Alberta

The Alberta Aviation Museum on Kingsway Avenue in Edmonton recently marked the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the first airmail flight in Western Canada.

It's hard to believe in this day of instant messaging, but at the turn of the 20th century mail delivery could sometimes take weeks or even months.

All that began to change on July 9, 1918 when famed American aviator Katherine Stinson was doing an aerial performance at the Calgary Exhibition grounds in her Curtiss Special biplane. As a promotion for the event, she was given a sack of 259 letters, which she flew 300 kilometres north to Edmonton, arriving to great fanfare.

"Girl Aviator Flies with Mail from Calgary to Edmonton — Gets Great Reception from Fair Crowd," read the headline in the Edmonton Bulletin. It was the first delivery of mail by air in western Canada and only the second airmail flight in all of Canada.

Throughout 1918, Stinson a pioneer aviator actually flew at six Alberta cities — Edmonton, Calgary, Red Deer, Camrose, Medicine Hat and Lethbridge. Her July 9, 1918 flight from Calgary to Edmonton was the first non-stop flight



between two major Western Canadian cities and the first air mail flight in Western Canada.

A re-enactment flight of that historic event was organized by the Canadian Aerophilatelic Society on July 9, 2006. For that re-enactment flight, there were 259 specially stamped letters flown in the same vintage mail bag.

Making the flight for the second time was a letter carried on the first flight in 1918. It was written by Henry Waterhouse and mailed to his wife, Arabella, who was visiting a relative in Edmonton. The letter was acquired for the flight from a grandson of Waterhouse who lives in Texas. The letter is one of only 23 known original letters still remaining.

A pioneering aviator and heroine, Stinson helped show the way for women pilots.

## Did you Know??


An air mail contract helped finance Trans-Canada Airlines (which later became Air Canada in 1965). On March 1, 1939, a daily air mail service began between Montreal and Vancouver. It was extended to the Maritimes

in January 1940. On July 1, 1948, Canada became the first country in the world to introduce domestic "all-up" service. First class mail was carried by air at regular postage rates.

## Canada Post Review and Pension Implications

On May 5, 2016, the Minister of Public Services and Procurement launched an Independent Review of the Canada Post Corporation with the objective that the Corporation provide quality services to meet the needs of Canadians at a reasonable price in a financially self-sustainable manner. One of the significant items in that review was the solvency issue of the Canada Post Pension Plan.

On September 12, 2016, the review task force published their discussion paper titled "Canada Post in the Digital Age - Discussion Paper, 2016". It was subsequently delivered to the Minister of Public Services and Procurement, and to the Standing Committee on Government Operations and Estimates which was to examine the results of the task force and to consult Canadians on the future of Canada Post. The Committee completed their work and then presented their observations and recommendations to parliament on December 13, 2016.

On January 24, 2018, the government announced a new vision for Canada Post. It dealt with only a few of the many issues studied by the task force and the Parliamentary Standing Committee. There was no mention of the pension issues as part of the January 2018 announcement.

On June 23, 2017, regulatory changes came into force designed to ease the burden of solvency deficit payments for federally regulated defined benefit pension plans. This change has allowed for a further delay in Canada Post having to make any special payments in 2018.

Based on estimates as of December 31, 2017, the defined benefit component of the Plan was funded at 114.1% on a going-concern basis and 81.1% funded on a solvency basis.
