PENSION ISSUE – Whatever happened to Bill C-27?

Bill C-27, the politically charged pension legislation that federal workers feared would create a dangerous precedent in the pension landscape, seems to have died as quietly as it appeared more than two years ago. Finance Minister Bill Morneau found himself accused of conflict of interest over the proposed legislation, which the opposition alleged would benefit his family business, Morneau Shepell. The bill would have allowed federally regulated employers and Crown Corporations to set up target-benefit pension plans, where benefits would no longer be guaranteed and, therefore, shift risk, instead of defined benefit plans.

The bill sparked a furor among federal unions and retirees who feared if Crown Corporations converted to target-benefit plans, the government would set its sights on the pensions of Canada's public servants, military, and RCMP.

Morneau was cleared of the conflict allegations but the bill stalled and never moved past first reading. Unions suspect the government simply let it die because of the political grief caused and heavy lobbying by labour and retirees, who still want the bill withdrawn.

"Our members have worked together to stop moves like Bill C-27 and policy that would put retirement security at risk for many Canadians, and this is the result of our collective strength," says National Association of Federal Retirees President Jean-Guy Soulière. "But we know that retirement security is at risk in our current environment, so we'll be working to make sure our next government, whatever its political stripe, makes retirement security a priority for current and next generations of retirees."

Debi Daviau, President of the Professional Institute of the Public Service, says public service pensions will continue to be a future target. Governments grappling with deficits, low interest rates, and an aging workforce will invariably look for ways to reduce pension costs. "We are always worried about attacks on our pensions. They are always a prime target, like when the Liberals scooped the plan's surplus years ago," says Daviau. "there is no reason to modernize existing pension plans, just create plans for those who don't have them."

A POSTAL SERVICE STORY

"There's gold in them thar' Post Offices!"

When I started my career in the Post Office as a mail handler in the late 1960's, there was a curious tale at the long gone Besserer Post Office in Ottawa about a sack of ol' bricks that had been used as a door stop for many years, only to be discovered to be gold bricks. Apparently years went by and thousands of people passed these by without realizing what they were.

No one I questioned had ever actually seen the gold bricks, but everyone seemed to know about the tale. I shrugged it off as an interesting story.

Then, much later, still working at Canada Post, but having moved to Toronto, I heard three similar tales about 21 Front Street.

One of the stories was that one day, a freight elevator broke down, and when the elevator repair guys investigated, they found a bag of bricks atop the roof the elevator car: you guessed it! Gold bricks! How they got there and why, no one knew, but also, no one knew anyone who had actually seen the bricks.

Another story floating around 21 Front Street was similar to the Besserer Street version: a bag of innocuous bricks holding a door open, and when scrapped, discovered to be gold bricks.

The third story was even more hard to believe: an old brick on a desk being used as a paperweight, and when scrapped.....eureka!

I often wondered: does every major Post Office in Canada have a similar story?

Was the Post Office so awash with gold bricks that they could be commonly used as doorstops?

Was this all urban legend that just kept circulated around and around?

At one time, the movement of gold and precious items was entrusted to the Post Office to move across the country, in the good care of the P.O.'s Railway Mail Service. This secure system of movement of valuables lasted over a hundred years, and only ended in the early 1970's.
