We would like to say a huge thank you to Jim Blain for his amazing work on the project called 'Honouring Our Own', a compilation of names of Postal Employees who were killed in World War 1 and 11. Since it's Remembrance Day this month, we would like to extract the names of the Postal Employees from the Central Yukootok Chapter from Jim's list and take time to remember them here:

Arthur Gibson, 150 Mile House; Marshall Wilder Pineo, Fort Fraser; Archie Blackwood Russell, Prince Rupert; James Elliot Stephen, Prince Rupert; Robert Haig Clapperton, Kamloops; Richard Godfrey East, Keremeos.

Of interest- Former Prince George Postmaster E.H. "Ernie" Burden from 1935-1953.

Ernie was born in Fredericton N.B. in 1888, arriving in Prince George on March 16, 1910, as part of a Survey party via the 'B.C. Express' crossing the river in Quesnel, traveling the Blackwater Road to Fort George. Enlisted with the '2nd Canadian Mounted Rifles' in Victoria in 1914, shipped out to France in September 2015, before moving to the front in Belgium. Wounded, survived, sent back to England where he spent 18 months recovering before returning to active duty in fighting the 'Battle of Vimy Ridge', in April 2017. Ernie returned home to Prince George in 1920, worked as a land surveyor until joining the post office in 1935.

An executive meeting of Chapter 29 was held in Kelowna on November 9. At this meeting, Mike Bonnie announced his resignation as the 1st Vice President of the South Okanagan Chapter the end of 2021, citing health



issues. The possibility of a Banquet in 2022 was discussed with a date sometime in September or October.



MESSAGE FROM MEDOC

The following message is from Shawn McCord, Assurance Medoc Insurance to the President of Canada Post Heritage Club.

"I want to advise that our MEDOC lines are ringing off the hook. What is driving further challenges is that travellers are cautious, and in turn, our average talk time is 4X the normal. So we are experiencing a perfect storm of volume right now.

We are doing everything in our power to borrow staff from other departments who have licensed travel staff, another division of RSA's travel business has licensed agents, etc. The wait times are quite long and likely won't subside for another week or so.



With border news happening, it has changed this year to a situation where 90% of the market wants to secure their travel insurance within a 2-3 week window. I hate blaming things on COVID but yet another example of how its tentacles are far reaching.
