A POSTAL SERVICE STORY

THOMAS FULLER, ARCHITECT OF THE PARLIAMENT BUILDINGS AND POST OFFICES

When Canada became a confederated nation in 1867, our first Prime Minister, John A. Macdonald, launched a national campaign to bring the country together. His goal was to create a federal presence that would be recognizable in both the small towns and big cities of Canada. In 1881, Macdonald appointed Thomas Fuller as Chief Architect for the Department of Public Works. He was tasked with designing and overseeing the construction of over 140 public buildings, including 74 post offices. Fuller's trademark designs were a combination of French Renaissance and High Gothic styles. Their presence across Canada established a national architectural image that evoked authority and stability, distinctly recognized as federal buildings.

The post offices Fuller constructed across the country, some of which still are standing today, were not Fuller's most famed constructions. Prior to his role as Chief Architect, in 1859 Fuller designed the Centre Block of the Parliament Buildings in Ottawa, including the Library of Parliament. He went on to design the New York State Capital in Albany, New York in 1867. Because of this history, Fuller's post offices reflect the architectural grandeur of the Parliament Buildings, although each individual building was somewhat tailored to the unique character of its city.

Thomas Fuller died in Ottawa in 1898, ending the period that has been defined as a "golden age of federal architecture in Canada." His work lives on in communities across the country. In 2016, Fuller was designated as a National Historic Person in Canada.

His son and grandson, Thomas William Fuller and Thomas George Fuller, continued in his legacy as important national architects as well.

Across Canada, there are still many of his post offices, armouries, and government buildings still standing, that have withstood the ravages of time and demolitions. One prime example is the old Galt Post Office, located in Cambridge, Ontario:



Former Galt Post Office, National Historic Site of Canada, built in 1884-87.

This building, begun in 1884 and finished in 1887, was erected to house the post office, customs, and other government services. It was designed under Dominion chief architect Thomas Fuller and built by contractor M. A. Piggott. The building was part of the national programme aimed at establishing a federal presence with the erection of striking edifices on prominent sites. Among this body of works, the Galt Post Office stands out for its excellent design and masterful stonework. The asymmetrical elevations and the richly textured surfaces produce a handsome and picturesque composition.

<u>HERITAGE CLUB SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM – 2022</u>

The Heritage Club is planning to award three (3) scholarships to children or grand children of all dues paying members of the Heritage Club. The scholarships are now valued at \$2,000 each for university or college studies. The scholarships will be awarded to students starting, for the first time, their first year of full time studies.

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA

Dependent children, including adopted children and stepchildren, grandchildren, wards in legal guardianship of all active members (dues paying member for the last 2 years) of a Heritage Club Chapter. Applicants who have previously received a Heritage Club scholarship are not eligible.

ELIGIBLE INSTITUTIONS

These scholarships are applicable to all Canadian educational institutions which have provincial degreegranting powers or their affiliates and at Canadian colleges or CEGEPs*.

QUALIFICATIONS OF APPLICANTS

Applicants must have completed the requirements for admission into the first year of an undergraduate degree program or college diploma program at a recognized educational institution. Applicants must have obtained an average of 75% (or equivalent) on the best 5 academic courses (see list of academic courses below) in the final year of secondary school or CEGEP (pre-university education). If applicants interrupt their schooling, the maximum period permitted between the completion of secondary school or CEGEP (pre-university education) and the commencement of an undergraduate university degree program or college diploma program is 1 year. During this period, students may NOT have undertaken postsecondary courses.

ACADEMIC COURSES – GRADE 12/CEGEP

Language Arts, Mathematics, Pure Mathematics, Applied Mathematics, Science, Biology, Chemistry, Physics, Social Studies, Geography, History, Literature, Accounting, Computer Graphics, Law. French, English or any one language.

SELECTION OF SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENTS

The jury is comprised of the Heritage Club executive committee members. The evaluation will be based on scholastic ability, character and leadership qualities at school and in the community. Decisions of the jury are final and without appeal.

APPLICATION DEADLINE

Submissions must be postmarked on or before June 30, 2022.
