HERITAGE CLUB SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM – 2023

The Heritage Club is planning to award three (3) scholarships to children or grand children of all dues paying members of the Heritage Club. The scholarships are valued at \$2,000 each for university or college studies. The scholarships will be awarded to students starting, for the first time, their first year of full time studies.

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA

Dependent children, including adopted children and stepchildren, grandchildren, wards in legal guardianship of all active members (dues paying member for the last 2 years) of a Heritage Club Chapter. Applicants who have previously received a Heritage Club scholarship are not eligible.

ELIGIBLE INSTITUTIONS

These scholarships are applicable to all Canadian educational institutions which have provincial degreegranting powers or their affiliates and at Canadian colleges or CEGEPs.

QUALIFICATIONS OF APPLICANTS

Applicants must have completed the requirements for admission into the first year of an undergraduate degree program or college diploma program at a recognized educational institution. Applicants must have obtained an average of 75% (or equivalent) on the best 5 academic courses (see list of academic courses below) in the final year of secondary school or CEGEP (pre-university education). If applicants interrupt their schooling, the maximum period permitted between the completion of secondary school or CEGEP (pre-university education) and the commencement of an undergraduate university degree program or college diploma program is 1 year. During this period, students may NOT have undertaken postsecondary courses.

ACADEMIC COURSES – GRADE 12/CEGEP

Language Arts, Mathematics, Pure Mathematics, Applied Mathematics, Science, Biology, Chemistry, Physics, Social Studies, Geography, History, Literature, Accounting, Computer Graphics, Law. French, English or any one language.

SELECTION OF SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENTS

The jury is comprised of the Heritage Club executive committee members. The evaluation will be based on scholastic ability, character and leadership qualities at school and in the community. Decisions of the jury are final and without appeal.

APPLICATION DEADLINE

Submissions must be postmarked on or before June 30, 2023.

A POSTAL SERVICE STORY

The POST HORN: what is it?

A PAGE IN POSTAL HISTORY...THE "POST HORN" AND POSTAL BADGES

Ok then, what is a "post horn" and where did it come from? How has our military postal service become so connected to it over the years?

Like many of us today, I turn to the internet for some initial answers and not surprisingly, what I learned many years ago as a young postie bears truth. "Wikipedia" states: "The **post horn** (also **posthorn**, **post-horn**, or **coach horn**) is a valveless cylindrical brass copper instrument with cupped mouthpiece, used to signal the arrival or departure of a post rider or mail coach. It was used especially by postilions of the 18th and 19th centuries."

My initial curiosity is satisfied, but I dig deeper. The standard form of the post horn came to be in Germany in the late 18th century, with its circular shape and three turns. Eventually, crooks, keys and valves were added in a French version, which became known as a cornet de poste or simply, the cornet. The English version of the horn, developed in the mid 19th century, was long and straight, but served the same purpose as the cylindrical version.

The English coach horn used for postal purposes from the mid 1800's until 1914 on the London-Oxford mail coach.



Now, when we take this historic symbol and or musical instrument and place it into a military context within the Canadian military, it takes some root in our world by 3 May 1911. It is this date that the Canadian Postal Corps officially becomes part of Canada's Militia, however the post horn still does not officially appear on any Corps identifier. Moreover, a postal hat badge did not even appear for the Corps until one was designed by Maj G. Ross and put into production on 18 April 1912. However, still no post horn was officially present.

Interestingly enough, there is no evidence that the CPC badge was even worn during World War I. Most likely the first post horn to be officially worn by Postal Corps personnel would have been in 1918-1919 when postal clerks deployed with the Canadian Siberian Expeditionary Force to Russia. The badge design for this force was coincidentally based mainly on the post horn.

On 20 Jun 1961, Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II decreed the title "Royal" to the Canadian Postal Corps. With this decree and subsequent name change for the Corps there came a new cap badge and accoutrements design. The post horn was to move to the forefront of this cap badge and the matching collar badges, along with the attached motto: "Servire Armatis", a Queen's crown and the "RCPC" logo.

Sadly, the RCPC was abolished, along with its cap badge in 1974, when the Corps was absorbed into the Administration Branch due to CF restructuring. Postal clerks were still able to retain some postal identity by being able to wear a post horn badge on the right side of their work dress above the name tape.

It wouldn't be until March 1987, and the stand up of the newly formed Postal Branch that postal clerks would once again get their own badge. This badge was adorned with a post horn, surrounded by oak leaves, the Queen's crown and the motto "Quo Officium Compellit" and "Postal". Matching collar badges and "Postal" shoulder titles were also proudly worn to identify CF postal clerks.

This badge was to remain in service until 2000 when the Postal Branch was disbanded and the trade was absorbed into the Logistics Branch. With the adoption of the Logistics cap badge, trade identifiers now only included trade qualification level badges that are worn on the lower right sleeve of the CF service dress uniform.

With the 100th Anniversary of the CF Postal Service in 2011 the celebrated post horn was once again proudly in our midst as it took centre stage within the centennial crest.
