The Annual Santa Letter Writing Program

Santa sent us an email again this year! He needs help up at the North Pole with keeping up with the Santa letters. Can you believe 1.5 million Santa letters were answered in 2021 with 60,000 from Japan alone! Some Canadian teachers who are teaching abroad are using our Santa letters as an English learning tool.

Our letters are translated into 27 different languages. Also, Canada Post is always looking for people who can speak and write in different languages to assist in the Santa Letter Writing Program.

Last year 174,120 letters were answered by Heritage members from across the country. Our Yellowhead Chapter will again be assisting Canada Post with the annual Santa Letter Writing Program. It's a huge task to help Santa by replying to every letter he receives so there are no disappointed children. This is an activity that you can safely do from home. It is a simple process:

• Let us know how many letters you would be willing to answer, they come in multiples of 20. We will get you the requested number of letters, along with the reply letters and envelopes. Additional instructions come with the bundles to assist you.

- The reply letters are already written, you just need to add the P.S. message.
 Always be careful to not make any promises Santa can't keep.
- You address the return envelopes and put them in the mail at your local retail postal outlet, or even in your local street letter box.
- Keep all the original Santa letters and return them to Heather

This year the Yellowhead Heritage Club supported Abbeyfield House with a donation.

Abbeyfield House Saskatoon opened in 2006 after many years of fundraising to secure money for the build. We are in Holiday Park in a gorgeous parklike setting, close to the river and golf course.

We have 11 bachelor suites with a shared kitchen. Tenants at Abbeyfield must be able to live independently which can sometimes mean external support can be in place, such as Home Care. We have a House Coordinator to prepare the lunch and supper meals and we eat together as a family. We also have a part-time House Manager who assists the Board with the administration and overall running of the House.

Abbeyfield's core mandate is to provide affordable accommodation and companionship for lonely elders within their own community. We also bridge the gap between being completely independent and needing more continuous care. We are a non-profit, registered charity, overseen by a volunteer Board of Directors. We are considered a "working Board" in that we contribute a great deal of time and energy using our acquired skills and expertise to keep expenses to a minimum to allow tenant rents to be as low as feasible. We are a warm and friendly environment that offers "Family Living." We share events and we are there for each other when needed. Abbeyfield is nondenominational and does not discriminate against race, gender, or background.

Abbeyfield Saskatoon seems to have a group of seniors of very modest income. Many folks cannot afford to live elsewhere. Times are very difficult!

Our Board works diligently to keep our expenses as

low as possible. However, with the increase in cost of groceries and services, coupled with our aging infrastructure, we are finding it difficult to maintain the high standard and quality of living we should all expect as we age. Recently Abbeyfield ordered new windows for our house. The windows will cost us \$45,000. We have some money set aside for the down payment, and we are hoping to find donors to help us with some of the total expense. Once the windows are in, we will need to repair the walls, paint, and replace the worn and damaged blinds.

Other projects the Board believe are necessary include replacing some of the carpets, painting additional areas, updating kitchen supplies, such as pots and pans, a slow cooker, cookie sheets, mixer, knives, dinner plates, etc. In the absence of replacing carpets with non-carpet flooring, we will need to purchase a carpet cleaner.

We are finding our volunteers are limited in what they can do so we need to hire out for some services. Abbeyfield hopes to find someone to do small, handyman-like repairs and maintenance. Someone with a truck willing to haul away refuse from our very large yard would be appreciated. We have quite the list of tasks needing to be done. We cannot do much without money. Our tenants can't afford to pay more.

National Heritage Club News

Travelling...Medoc Johnson Insurance Information

If you have a medical emergency while you are out of the country call Medoc within 24 hours of the emergency. Shawn from Johnson says they like to be aware of the claim as soon as possible to coordinate everything. Also, their insurance now includes coverage for Covid 19 related incidents. They work alongside Canada Life. Coverage can be purchased regardless of age or health status with a few exceptions. They provide up to \$10 million in emergency coverage. You must also call Canada Life within the first 24 hours after an incident. When you have used your limit with Canada Life. which can happen very quickly then Johnson kicks in and covers any additional costs. Make sure you have your Canada Life Health Care Plan number and your Canada Post Employee ID number with you; you will need them to make your claim. Here are the numbers to call in case of emergency. Always keep all this information in a safe place when you are travelling so it can be accessed in case of emergency.
