As you may remember from our last newsletter the relationship with Canada Post has changed. Canada Post is facing significant financial challenges; this has impacted all Heritage Clubs. Our mailing privileges has been cancelled. We were told that they would allow one more mail-out but the details have not been provided at this time. While our club is small, and the loss of funding will hit us hard. Presently, our finances are in good shape. You will continue to receive your newsletter by email, events will still happen, and our Heritage Club community will continue.

As a club, we plan to support the Santa letters program. Anyone thinking of traveling can still benefit from the discounts offered with Medoc, which was rebranded as belairdirect travel insurance in July. You must be a member in good standing with the Heritage Club to access the insurance. A link to their website is available on the Heritage Club website at heritageclub.ca

To preserve this association of friends, good times and activities, it is now more important than ever to pay your annual dues. Dues for 2026 will be due in January. There will be more info in the next newsletter, with a reminder.

Lastly, our pension will survive if Canada Post goes under. The pension funds are managed internationally by a team of 60 people, totally independent from Canada Post. There is 32 million in assets, with 65% of our assets held in Canada. So all is good.

Recently a new program has been added to their schedule that might be of interest you. *The Voice of Older Adults – SCOA Radio* started broadcasting in August. The program has different hosts each week with the show being left to the imagination and format of the host. Some shows are more information based; others are more relaxed.

One of the first guests, airing on August 14th was Dee Winslow, a retired Canada Post letter carrier recalling her memories of getting her first miniskirt and what it meant to her in the 60's. It was an important symbol of freedom for young girls and the changing times.

it was like to be the first female letter carrier in Saskatoon.
